together for the two ancient squirrels her son, Michael, had accidentally adopted.

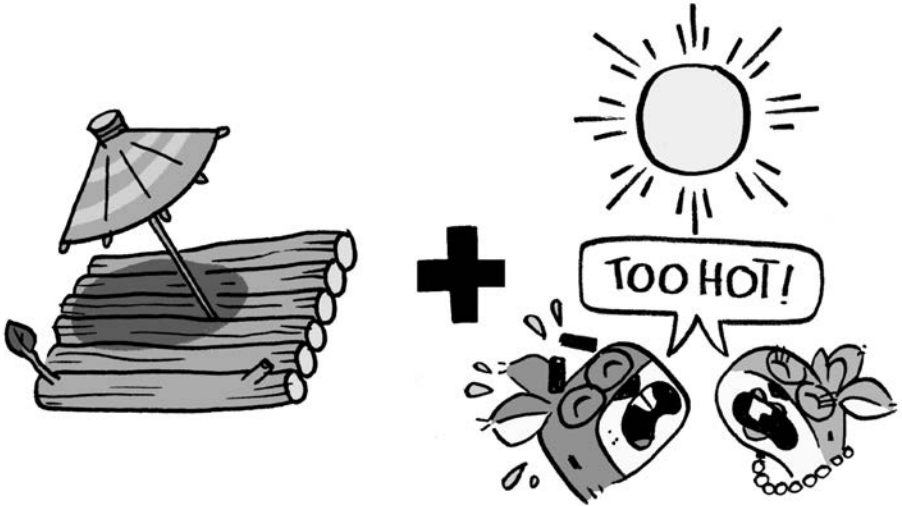
“Did you hear that, Merle?” Pearl called across the room to her husband, who was sitting with Dr. Gomez and Michael. “We’ve got shiplap!”
