DAY ONE

After leaving the store one day, I told her to wait in the grass next to the car while I clipped her younger sister into her car seat. When I turned around to get her, she was up in a tree!

"Look, Mommy!" she beamed with pride. "I climbed the highest tree I could find!"

It wasn't a very big tree, and she hadn't climbed very high, but she had taken advantage of a spare moment to begin a new adventure.



Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is.

EPHESIANS 5:15-17

Each season of parenting brings its unique challenges and reliefs. Whether kids are in school or home full time, our days contain little pockets of quiet time. What will we do with these moments? How will we fill them?

Often, I escape in the easiest way I know. I pull out my

phone, scroll through social media, watch a funny video, or catch up on the half-finished episode of whatever I'm currently watching on Netflix. I turn to these diversions almost like comfort food. The problem is, I never leave these moments with anything of value. They come and go so quickly. I've squandered them, and I leave feeling unfulfilled.

Father, help me make the most of the time you give me this week. In the fleeting moments, show me who I can love or how I can grow so I make the most of every opportunity to bring You glory.

DAY TWO

Tucking In Puppy

My oldest is more than a little controlling. She has specific ideas about how everything in her environment should be all the time. One night, she came out of her room after bedtime because she thought she had put Puppy on the sofa to sleep for the night, but to her dismay, she discovered Puppy on the shelf with the rest of her stuffed animals.

She stood in the doorway and frantically delivered a list of instructions. “Mommy, can you please take Puppy and put her to sleep on the sofa for the night? Tuck her in cozy with the blanket in her favorite spot. Make sure you sing to her and give her a big hug. I’m going to leave her right here by my door for you.”

When I agreed, she laid the stuffed dog on the floor and reluctantly returned to bed. Sixty seconds later, the door opened again. This time she held a blanket. “Mom, I found Puppy’s favorite blanket! She can’t sleep without it. Please use this blanket to tuck her in. Puppy is still right here. You haven’t tucked her in yet. Please don’t forget.”

I assured her I could handle it, and she went back to bed again. In her world, Puppy is of the utmost importance. As her mother, I know it’s inconsequential. Even so, I place Puppy on the sofa, with the blanket, and tuck her in carefully before turning my attention to more pressing matters. I do this because, as ridiculous as the request is, I love my daughter. I care about the things that worry her.



Answer me when I call to you,
my righteous God.
Give me relief from my distress;
have mercy on me and hear my prayer. . . .

Know that the LORD has set apart his faithful
servant for himself;
the LORD hears when I call to him. . . .

In peace I will lie down and sleep,
for you alone, LORD,
make me dwell in safety.

PSALM 4:1, 3, 8

We often approach God with the same persistent desire to control. We have very specific ideas about how life should go, how we'd like Him to handle certain situations, and how He should care for us. When God is silent about something we think is important, or when He doesn't give the answer in our timing, we believe He doesn't care about the issue as much as we do.

God hears every request we make, no matter how small or inconsequential in the grand scheme of eternity. No matter how ridiculous the request, He cares deeply for us. No matter what's bothering us, He wants to know about it. He wants to give us peace so our worries no longer have a hold over our hearts and minds.

Father, thank You for caring about the things that worry me, no matter how big or small. Thank You for loving me, promising to take care of me, and being in control of everything. Help me rest in Your peace.

What do I need to pray about today and then release control of?



DAY THREE

That Looks Familiar

I grew up shopping at secondhand stores and garage sales, and the habit stuck. I love finding an amazing deal, digging through trash to discover treasure, and experiencing the thrill of the hunt. Going into a store with a rack of the same shirt in multiple colors and organized by size is devastatingly boring.

The other day, I was shopping at one of my favorite resale shops that benefits a nonprofit for women facing unexpected pregnancy. I love donating to and buying from this little shop. My middle girl was with me, and I let her pick out a stuffed animal to bring home. She chose a cat that looked very familiar. While I was sure my other daughter had the same one at home, I figured it wouldn't hurt for each of them to have one of their own. When we got home, I told my oldest that her sister now had a matching stuffed cat.

She looked confused and replied, "But mom, I gave that one away because I didn't want it anymore." That's when I remembered us cleaning it out of her closet a few weeks before and putting it in the bag to donate. We'd just bought back the same stuffed animal we'd donated to the store! It's a good business model for them, but not a good shopping strategy for me. I should have just kept the stuffed animal to begin with.



You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

EPHESIANS 4:22-24

What is familiar to us provides comfort, even if it isn't the best choice. Even though my daughter had a hundred new stuffed animals to choose from, she decided on one that was familiar to her. When we entertain certain thought patterns of comparison, dismiss internal issues that need to be addressed, or uphold unrealistic expectations, we reinforce the labels that shackle our identity. We are choosing the same deceitful desires repeatedly and wondering why nothing ever changes.

Meanwhile, the Bible offers us a store full of new thought patterns, varied choices, and ultimate freedom! God didn't create us to stay stuck in our old ways, but to be like Him in His perfection. We must be willing to let go of our natural inclinations and comfortable thought patterns to see with God's perspective of holiness. Instead of choosing the familiar, we must choose the new self God made us to be.

Father, show me any area of my heart and mind that continue to return to old habits You have redeemed. Give me discernment to recognize those crucial moments of choice and the discipline to choose with wisdom rather than familiarity.

What action or thought pattern have I been freed from but continue returning to?



DAY FOUR

What's in a Name?

My oldest daughter loved to name things: her stuffed animals, dolls, and any creature she discovered in the wild. She fills a morning trip to the zoo with her insistent need to name every animal we encounter. Her names are not very creative, but they are descriptive.

She names a beautifully feathered parrot “Colorfully.” A toy pony with a pink mane she calls “Pinky.” Her modeling clay, shaped into what’s supposed to be a giraffe, she refers to as “Squishy.”

These names don’t reflect the objects’ true nature, value, character, or quality; they simply reflect the outer appearance. They’re superficial descriptions.



See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him.

1 JOHN 3:1

But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God,

who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

JOHN 1:12-13 ESV

As moms, we often give ourselves names. Maybe we name ourselves “the mom who’s always late,” or “the mom who doesn’t recognize her body anymore.” Sometimes even, “the mom who has no idea what she’s doing.”

These labels describe us, but too often we allow them to define us. This beautiful passage in 1 John reminds us we have only one true name, “child of God.”

We find it difficult to remember our true identity because the world judges and labels us based on our outward appearance. If people don’t know our Father, they won’t recognize us as His children. Fortunately, we know the opinion of the only One who matters.

Even on the days when we don’t measure up, when we feel defeated and commit every mom fail in the book, these actions don’t define our identity. My true name, and your true name, is “child of God.”

This identity will never change because God offered it to us freely because of His love and grace. We did nothing to earn it. There is no pressure to “be enough” because we all come empty-handed, yet God calls us His own.

Father, thank You for Your love, which defines who I am and gives me confidence in Your power to continue to mold me into Christlikeness. Help me recognize the false labels I’ve given myself and replace these lies with Your truth.

What name or names have I given myself and allowed to define my identity? How do they compare with the ones God has given me?



DAY FIVE

Can You Feel the Love?

My oldest daughter can read my mind, I know it. Sometimes as I watch her play, I look at her, and my thoughts are far from lovely. I think, *How did she get that huge knot in the back of her hair? I wish she'd let me brush it out. It amazes me how this girl can go from being groomed to looking homeless so quickly.* She looks up from her toys, and I can tell by the self-conscious look on her face that she knows what I'm thinking. I immediately regret it.

Thankfully, it works both ways. Sometimes I stare at her in amazement as she colors a picture. I think, *Look at this beautiful face and those eyes so concentrated on her work. She's such a thoughtful girl, and so smart. How did I get the blessing of being her mom? I love her so much!*

She looks up from her drawing and, with a beaming smile, throws herself into my arms for a giant hug. She knows. My love for her and my thoughts about her reverberate from every unspoken expression of my being. Without me even asking, my daughter gives me the gift of her embrace.

PSALM 145:1-3, 8-14

We know God can hear our thoughts, but we rarely consider that our thoughts matter to Him. In the same way our children thrive under our loving gaze, God revels in the moments that we show Him our devotion through gratitude and praise. God created us to glorify Him. When we declare His glory with shouts of exultation in our thoughts and actions or sit in silent awe of His majesty, we fulfill our purpose. When we take on a posture of praise, we place God on the throne of our hearts and experience the peace that comes with His preeminence.

For our prayer time today, let's not ask for anything. Let's simply pray words of adoration to our King from the Psalm above. Linger over the lines and let your entire being reverberate your posture of humble gratitude and praise.

In what ways do I experience God's pleasure when I live in an attitude of thanksgiving?



DAY SIX

No More Yellow

Do your kids have a favorite color? My oldest loves every color except yellow. She. Doesn't. Like. Yellow. I've heard of kids not liking a color, but she takes her dislike to the extreme. When we were purging toys, she separated all the yellow crayons from her crayon bucket and gave them to me, saying, "You can give these away. I don't like the yellow ones."

One day during her nap time (which is really just resting time because this girl does not turn off), I heard a commotion in her room and found all her books scattered across her bedroom floor. She'd separated out every book that had a yellow cover. Without an explanation, she simply handed me the stack and said, "I don't want these books on my shelf."

I don't know how long it took her to separate her books, but she has a dedication to her dislike that I find impressive. In her mind, life without yellow books and crayons is better than life with them, even though it means getting rid of things.



If your right eye causes you to stumble, gouge it out and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one part of your body than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to stumble, cut it off and throw it away. It is better

for you to lose one part of your body than for your whole body to go into hell.

MATTHEW 5:29–30

I always thought Matthew 5:29–30 was a little extreme, but I think this is the point. Sin is nothing to experiment with. If we allow it to stay in one small area of our lives, it grows and takes over like weeds in a neglected garden.

We must actively seek any trace of sin in our lives and remove it so it has no hold on us. Otherwise, it will not only steal the area of our lives it occupies, it will take over our entire being. We must be thorough in our mission to scrub entangling sin from every part of our life.

Seeing my daughter's determination to rid her world completely of yellow has given me a new resolve to search my life for any thoughts that don't fulfill God's purpose for me. I'm determined to toss out unhealthy actions, unloving words, and self-serving attitudes like the filth they are. Our lives are more complete when we take certain things away, especially those things that don't align with God's character. How tragic for us to gain the world but lose our souls.

Father, show me the unnoticed and unchecked sins in my life. Give me the resolve to remove them, not counting their removal as loss, but as incredible gain. Thank You for Your unending faithfulness to forgive and restore me.

What sin do I need to eradicate from my life? What are some practical steps that I can take to do so this week?



DAY SEVEN

A Lesson Learned

Just one month into pre-K3, my oldest amazed me with all the things she learned. I could tell exactly what her teacher had said in the classroom because my daughter put it into practice immediately—but not by changing her behavior or applying it to herself. Instead, she implemented her newly discovered knowledge as a tactic to control her little sister.

Her constant narrative went something like this:

“Sit crisscross applesauce.”

“We do not push our friends. Keep your hands to yourself.”

“One, two, three, eyes on me. I said, ‘EYES ON ME!’”

Her little sister grew tired of being groomed into a preschool student. I kept imagining how wonderful it would be if my oldest practiced the simple truths she imposed on her sister. While she could identify how others need to improve, she didn’t recognize her own need for change.



Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples:
“The teachers of the law and the Pharisees sit in Moses’ seat. So you must be careful to do everything they tell you. But do not do what they do, for they do not practice what they preach. They tie up heavy, cumbersome loads and put them on

other people's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to lift a finger to move them."

MATTHEW 23:1-4

I love when Jesus comes down on the Pharisees, but my excitement wanes when I discover I might actually be a member of the group He's calling out. How often do we read the Bible or hear a message in church and immediately think of a person who we wish were hearing those words? How often do we think, "If only so-and-so could learn to apply that!"

By taking this stance, we miss out on a beautiful opportunity to grow in our own relationship with Christ. We trade a moment of revelation and growth for a moment of judgment and silent accusation. What lesson did God have for us in that moment that we missed while being too busy focusing on others? What promise did He want to whisper to our hearts? What grace did He desire to extend to meet us in our weakness?

Instead of embracing the gift of being shaped by the God of the Universe, we trade humility for pride, a teachable heart for an arrogant one, and an obedient spirit for a spirit of judgment. What a tragedy! We learn the Word but miss its purpose.

Father, help me not only to know Your Word, but to apply it to my life. Allow me to hear the hard truths You have for me and learn humbly from them, rather than being quick to hold others accountable to those same truths.

What spiritual lesson do I know well enough to hold others accountable to, but need to apply in my own life?



DAY EIGHT

Turn It Louder

The only way to make a hot summer day in Louisiana bearable is to splash some water on it. We have a mermaid sprinkler, and my girls love playing in it. When the water pressure is high enough, the mermaid spins, spraying water in every direction.

My oldest is my adventurous girl. She's constantly telling me, "Turn the water louder." This is her way to let me know we need more water pressure to get the mermaid spinning.

My middle girl is more reserved in her sprinkler preferences. She likes the water pressure low and predictable. As soon as the mermaid spins and things get chaotic, she backs away.



The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. . . .

I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me.

JOHN 10:10-11, 14 ESV

I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.

JOHN 16:33

John 10 gives us a picture of Jesus as our Shepherd, faithfully leading us as His sheep. Many times, we assume that having life to the full means having more of only the good parts. In reality, having life to the full simply means having more life. It takes life and turns it “louder.” We still experience highs and lows.

The picture of Christ as a shepherd is such a powerful one because it addresses all the lows that come into play: wolves attacking the flock, sheep wandering off, and thieves breaking in to steal the sheep. Having the Shepherd doesn’t stop these things from happening, but it provides a haven for the sheep amid the turbulence.

He assures us that the safety of the sheep is so important that He lays down His life to protect them. When we sign up as one of Christ’s sheep, we agree to follow Him no matter where He leads. Our previously lazy sheep life suddenly becomes more adventurous, more full.

There will be days when this full life seems to spin out of control, but we have the assurance that our Shepherd is vigilant and is guiding us well. Instead of backing away in fear, we can confidently step into the unknown, expecting our Shepherd to turn life “louder!”

Father, help me trust You in the moments when I’m tempted to back away instead of stepping confidently into the adventure of each day. Give me faith to follow You into each high and low, knowing that You gave Your life for me.

In what areas of life do I ask God to turn things “louder”? In what areas do I back away?



DAY NINE

Pretending to Sleep

As soon as my oldest moved from her crib to a bed, she began creating reasons to get out of it. She needs a million things at bedtime: a drink of water, a special stuffed animal, a song, a book, one more hug, etc. In the mornings, she awakens bright and early, her face peering into mine at the bedside, whispering, “Mom, is it time to get up yet?”

On occasion, I’ll be lying awake in bed before she wakes up, mentally preparing for the day ahead. When I hear her door open and her footsteps pad toward our bedroom, I close my eyes and pretend to be asleep. I lie still, holding my breath, hoping she’ll go back to her room for a little more rest. It rarely works, but I try anyway.



Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me.

REVELATION 3:20

But while [the son] was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him.

The son said to him, “Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son.”

But the father said to his servants, “Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let’s have a feast and celebrate. For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.” So they began to celebrate.

LUKE 15:20-24

Many times, we picture God as a parent trying to get a little more rest. When we pray, we may feel as if we’re bothering Him and that He’s choosing not to hear our prayers. If we view God based on our own parenting, we’ll never understand the true nature of His love, because we are imperfect.

The Bible, however, gives us a completely different image of God. Instead of pretending to be asleep while we push through the door to reach Him, God takes the initiative. He’s the one knocking on the door, waiting patiently for us to open it and let Him into our lives. He’s the Father, running to embrace us even after we’ve made every mistake possible.

What a powerful change in perspective! He shows an urgency, a desire to be with us, and an unfailing resilience in His efforts that shatters our misconceptions about His ambivalence. He pursues us!

Father, thank You for being a God who pursues me! When I’m tempted to believe You’re distant or uncaring, help me remember this picture of You standing at the door of my heart and knocking.
