## IMPORTANT HISTORICAL NOTE

ON MAY 10, 1940, Nazi Germany invaded Netherlands.\* Their plan to eradicate the Jews—including children—began by restricting their rights. But later they shipped them to concentration camps where they were killed or forced into brutal labor.

By late 1944, nearly all of the Jews had been wiped out of Amsterdam. So the Nazis hunted down Jews in the rest of the country. The Nazis' efforts were particularly intense in the area around Utrecht, a city in central Netherlands. This novel is based on the little-known but true stories of the heroism of the Dutch Resistance near Utrecht. These clever and courageous volunteers saved as many Jewish children as they could.

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\* Important Note about Netherlands: The Dutch refer to their nation as "Netherlands." For the sake of authenticity, this story refers to their homeland as "Netherlands" rather than "the Netherlands."



CHAPTER I

# RUN!

WILHELMINA PARK  
UTRECHT, NETHERLANDS  
DECEMBER 26, 1944  
9:00 P.M.

ANY MOMENT NOW, thirteen-year-old Dirk Ingelse would be running for his life. And if the plan failed, he'd be thrown in jail. Or worse.

Heavy clouds hid the moon. The piercing north wind chilled his face, the only part of him not covered this frigid night. Dirk had been out here in these below-freezing temperatures for twenty minutes, and his whole body was cold. But he didn't dare stamp his feet or clap his gloved hands for warmth. Dressed in black from head to toe, he stood statue-still next to a large oak tree, his eyes and ears straining for anything he might see or hear. He recalled Papa's words to him: *We've planned this for days. Now it's time for action. Time for courage.*

*Shree! Shree! Shree!* Shrill alarm whistles shrieked from a block away. Dirk's throat tightened. He poked his head out from his hiding place near the entrance to the park. He could just make out a cyclist speeding toward him, half a block away. According to the plan, her bike basket carried a pouch stuffed with food ration cards, grabbed in a raid on the Nazi-controlled rationing center. This girl was the first leg in a relay to get the ration cards to the orphanage, Kinderhuis. Dirk had visited the orphanage and seen the empty kitchen cupboards. He and his family had returned to the enemy-occupied zone of Netherlands to help Jewish children threatened by the Nazis. Kinderhuis had taken in several Jewish children already. Now was his chance!

With her head down, the girl approaching Dirk pumped her legs vigorously. But an army truck chasing her was only forty meters behind—and gaining. The engine's roar and its blazing headlights jangled Dirk's nerves. Then he remembered what Papa said.

*You can do this. Grab the bag. Be brave. Be quick.* Dirk took a deep breath and stepped from concealment. As the girl, maybe fifteen years old, approached him, her eyes were wide with raw terror. She glanced behind her, screamed, and her bike wobbled. She made a wild throw of the bag of food coupons and pedaled away at top speed without looking back.

Dirk surged forward and snatched up the black pouch. He waved his arms at the truck to divert attention from the girl and sprinted into the park. The driver gunned the engine, veered from the road, and barged onto the pedestrian path, which was barely wide enough for the vehicle. As Dirk

bolted down the snowy paved lane, with the pouch pressed against his right side, he took care to avoid stepping on the tire destroyers. The Dutch Resistance had scattered dozens of them—three nails welded together, with the sharp tip pointing up—on the main path into the park.

Ten seconds later, Dirk heard a satisfying *POP! POP! POP!* from behind as the nails punctured the truck tires. He glanced back. Six Nazi soldiers leaped out of the back of the disabled vehicle and gave chase. Dirk poured on the speed, gulping extra air and squeezing the pouch more tightly. He was a fast runner, but these guys chased him like there was a price on his head.

With his adversaries in hot pursuit, Dirk sprinted down the park path. He tried to breathe in a controlled rhythm, but the flashlights of his pursuers cut his confidence. The enemy's beams were blades that sliced the frigid night air. When one swung near him, he instinctively arched his back as if it could slash him.

He looked left and right while he ran. The large park pond was on his left. There'd be no ambush from that direction. He ran straight ahead and plunged into the nearest stand of trees and shrubs, daring his enemies to follow him.

"*Stopp!*" a soldier shouted. Shoulder-high bushes swished as Dirk blasted past. He couldn't see the enemy, but he heard them. They chose the longer route around the pocket of woods—clearly hoping to catch him on the other side.

Dirk's path was no easy shortcut. Hawthorn tree branches raked his face, and their razor thorns clawed his cheeks. "Aagh," he said, wincing at the sharp stab of pain. He burst

out of the bushes, but now the lights behind grew brighter, and the voices louder.

“*Gib auf!*” one shouted. But Dirk wouldn’t surrender. His eighteen-year-old sister, Els, had told him about the cruelty of the Gestapo, the German secret police. In early November, they’d ambushed her and tortured her. And if he surrendered, he’d never get the food ration cards to the orphanage.

He burst out of the bushes and trees. His feet thumped one of the many walkways that looped between the islands of greenery. He was three-fourths of the way across the park. But his thighs burned, and the frigid air jabbed its icy slivers into his lungs. Those soldiers hunting him were a pack of wolves. And he was the rabbit. He’d always been fleet-footed, but now his speed wasn’t enough. His chest tightened.

“*Ich sehe ihn!*” a harsh voice shouted.

Since the soldier had spotted him, Dirk had to do something. He darted into a stand of evergreen trees. Their needle-laden branches partially blocked the beams of the enemy’s lights. After vaulting over some fallen branches, he tripped on a root and sprawled. Several sticks snapped loudly. He scrambled to his feet. Dirk was almost to the rendezvous point, the frozen canal on the edge of Wilhelmina Park, where Els waited with friends. But his foes were close behind.

“*Keine Bewegung, sonst schießen wir!*” a hostile voice shouted.

The evergreens shielded Dirk from their probing flashlights, so maybe the threat to shoot was a bluff. But then shots rang out behind him.

Seconds later, he rushed out of the cover of the trees and

reached the edge of the canal. More shots came, maybe a dozen. Several kicked up dirt only a few meters away. Hemmed in by the enemy behind and the waterway in front, Dirk had to do the one thing he dreaded. He ran straight at the canal and launched himself over the edge. His arms and legs flailed as he fell toward the canal's ice, which lay two meters below ground level.
